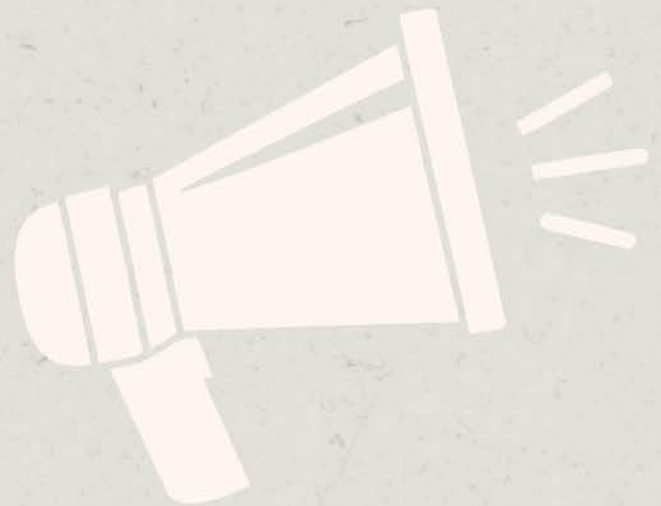

Pitch Presentation Tips

Know your audience. The judges are your audience, so it's important to understand what they're looking for. They want creative ideas. Some planning that considers how this can come to life. They want to know you have done some research.
